If you've seen Xavier Hale running around with a container of "green stuff" and wondered what it was, well here's the basic recipe! 1 cucumber, quartered lengthwise

1 apple

4 stalks celery

1 lemon, peeled

1 1-2 inch chunk of ginger

1/4 bunch of parsley

Juice all of the ingredients in a blender or juicer. Serve immediately. Makes 3 cups. Enjoy!

From the Board of the Westport Village Society

A few weeks ago, at the April 2 WMAC meeting, the topic of activity at Blues Beach in Chadbourne Gulch was discussed. The topic was gain discussed at the last quarterly WVS meeting on April 18. It was clear that a lot of people in the Westport community were interested in Blues Beach and some have strong opinions on how they would like the beach to be accessed and used. WVS has been in communication with CalTrans, the owner of the property at the beach as well as north and south of it, since November of 2001. The final outcome of that sequence of communications was a letter from CalTrans in August of 2007 stating that a precursor to any action taken by CalTrans would be to "ensure that all interested parties have an opportunity to provide input." A public meeting would be the mechanism for interested parties to provide input. No meeting materialized at that time.

The WVS board passed a motion to contact CalTrans to see if they were still interested in a public meeting related to Blues Beach and to prepare a list of "talking points" with the objective of capturing favored use and issues related to use from as many points of view as possible. The list would not include any "solutions" only issues. The WVS board was not certain that the majority of the WVS members would want WVS involved with Blues Beach, but we were sure a significant number of members were interested in Blues Beach.

A follow-up call to CalTrans indicates they are interested in having a public meeting, and the "talking points" list is in an early draft. The key to moving forward is to determine local public interest in a meeting and making sure any meeting is well attended with representatives of multiple points of view. I will continue to communicate with CalTrans and communicate any results via email, notices on the store bulletin board, and posting on the Westport Village Society website.

Part of the purpose of this article is to request feedback. Is this an appropriate discussion for WVS to be involved in? Blues Beach is seen as a community resource, but what role should the community play in influencing how it is utilized? Would you like to add favored uses and issues related to uses to the "talking points" list? You can provide feedback by e-mailing this community forum address: BluesBeachDiscussion@westportvillagesociety.org, or you can send a note via US Mail to WVS Blues Beach Discussion, PO Box 446, Westport, CA 95488. Or, you can talk to any of the WVS board members. Anyone sending email will also receive any updates on the developments of the CalTrans meeting.

One last note, the Chadbourne Gulch, Blues Beach topic will be on the agenda again at the next WMAC meeting on May 7. The draft letter that was presented at the April 2 meeting has been removed from consideration by the WMAC. The focus of the meeting will be to gather more community input and an exchange of ideas on this matter. The WMAC would like to encourage the community to attend the meeting on May 7th at 7 PM at the Westport Church.

The Time Traveler

Looking through photographs in the Westport Village Society archive, I came across this view of Main Street looking south from a point near Otto's Westport Inn. It was taken in 1896, which was a pivotal time for the town. This was taken in the midst of a devastating recession of national scope that was only gradually easing. Every local mill shut down during this recession, which was only marginally smaller than the Great Depression of the 1930s. Perhaps that is the reason the street is so completely devoid of any people, horses, and wagons.

The first building on the left occupies the lot where the store is now located. Detailed fire insurance maps from 1891 and 1898 identify the building as a blacksmith and wagon repair shop that was no longer present by 1909. The large building on the right with a hanging sign was the location of the Pioneer Stables in the 1890s and 1900s. Beyond it on the west side of Main Street several buildings are present along the headlands. Most of them are listed as vacant on the 1898 fire insurance map. They formerly included a butcher shop, telegraph office, warehouses and a few dwellings. The utility poles along the east side of the street carried telephone and telegraph wires. PG&E's electrical grid did not reach Westport until 1950.

The economy did pick up again by the turn of the century. However, the town's vitality remained strongly linked to regional market fluctuations. The 1906 earthquake and fire created a huge demand for timber, but that demand slumped again idling many mills by the mid 1910s. And so it went, with the next major slump from the mid 1920s until the late 1930s. That boom and bust atmosphere continually reshaped the town from its businesses and dwellings to the people who stayed or moved on.



Satellite Internet Tip

Mike Neal shared a tip that some of you may want to pursue. Our rural area lacks internet broadband service other than satellite service. For that reason, there is a special program that will supply 10 gigabytes of monthly upload and download capacity for \$40/month with free installation and no contract. It is offered by Wildblue, but you won't find out about it by dialing their 800 phone number. Many of locals already signed up for the Exede service for \$60/month on a 2 year contract.

The actual delivered speed varies, but I've measured my uplink at 1-2 mb/second and the download at 2-8 mb/second. They advertise up to 12 mb. Another nice feature is that between midnight and 5 AM they do not measure your use, so you can schedule large downloads for that time slot and it will not impact your monthly quota. If you want this service you must not currently have broadband service. Call local Wildblue technician Matthew Tyson at (707) 272-3278 or email him at mattietyson@hotmail.com. It is the only way to get this great deal.
